



n March 1, we implemented a new hotline for reporting electric, water, streetlight or sewer issues that makes reporting more efficient. The new number is 1-855-528-4278(4CSU) and you will need to enter your College Station Utilities account number to automatically identify your location.

Providing your account number enables us to dispatch crews quicker and manage the situation better. This system also captures data for all outages, not just major ones, which allows for more proactive repairs, replacements and upgrades.

We've provided durable stickers (see right) along with your bill this month for you to keep your College Station Utilities account number in a handy place. Another idea is to store the new hotline number and your account number in your mobile phone.

WHY DID WE NEED IT?

In 2001, CSU began using an automated troubleshooting and reporting system to handle the large number of calls during an outage. Dispatch operators had to manually turn on the system, which resulted in missed calls and consumed valuable time in critical situations. Adding to the frustration was the fact that system upgrades were incompatible with the city's advanced telephone system.

As a result, CSU began investigating ways to upgrade the system to improve customer service, troubleshooting, and provide more accurate outage information and data.

The old system only accepted 14 calls at once. The new system handles an unlimited amount and it will always be activated, so missed calls won't be a

problem. The new system will also have voice recognition capability, allowing you to speak your account number instead of entering it numerically. After you enter your account number, your address will be read back for verification.

ALWAYS REPORT OUTAGES

Unfortunately, power and water outages happen. When they do, it's important for College Station Utilities customers to let us know promptly. If you simply assume your neighbor has already reported it, service restoration may be delayed. Your timely report also helps us determine the size of the outage.

Floodplains and Flood Insurance What you need to know

Floodplains are regulatory boundaries established to preserve the floodcarrying capacity of our creeks, channels and rivers. These are established by engineering analysis and reviewed, approved and mapped by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). College Station has special regulations in place to regulate construction and other developments within floodplains to help manage potential dangers associated with flooding. Property owners, renters and businesses can purchase flood insurance through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) as a result of the City of College Station's floodplain management ordinances. In exchange, the NFIP provides federally-backed flood insurance affordable rates.

Communities that participate in the NFIP are rated by FEMA through the Community Rating System. FEMA encourages communities to implement floodplain management standards which exceed the minimum NFIP standards. In return, FEMA rewards communities with higher standards by offering a discount on flood insurance

policies. The current City of College Station rating is a seven. This rating provides residents with a 15 percent discount on flood insurance policies.

It is important to know that, if you have a mortgage from a federally regulated or insured lender on a home located in a highrisk flood area, federal law requires you to purchase flood insurance. Also, if you've received a federal grant or loan for previous flood losses, you must have a flood policy to qualify for future aid.

Any development in the floodplain without a permit is illegal. To acquire a permit or to report such illegal activity, contact the Planning and Development Department at 979.764.3570. To learn more about floodplains, flood insurance or related information, visit cstx.gov/floodplains.







Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event - April 27

The Spring Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event will take place Saturday, April 27 from 7 a.m. - 2 p.m. at the University Services Building. The event can be accessed by going east from Hwy 6 on Harvey Road, then taking the first left after the Veterans Park entrance. No entry will be allowed from University Drive.

This free event is the safest way to properly dispose of your Household Hazardous Wastes. Some examples of accepted materials include paint, medications, computers, gasoline, pesticides, herbicides, motor oil, antifreeze, batteries, compact fluorescent light bulbs and household cleaning agents.

College Station to Celebrate 75th Anniversary

College Station, Texas was designated by the U.S. Postal Service in 1877. The name was derived from the train station located near Texas A&M University campus. On Oct. 19, 1938, citizens voted 217 to 39 to incorporate the City of College Station. The first City Council meeting was held on Feb. 25, 1939.



he City of College Station will recognize its 75th anniversary with an exhibit at the George Bush Presidential Library and Museum from Oct. 21 to Jan. 4. Titled "College Station: A Community History," the exhibit features local memorabilia, artifacts and stories that capture the unique history of College Station, Texas, from the time leading up to its incorporation in 1938 to today.

Displayed items are grouped into various segments that highlight legacy families, homes, schools, businesses, media and government in College Station during its growth from an outlying rural area to a city of almost 100,000 in population. Among the many items proposed for display include:

* An original playbook and championship ring owned by the late Manning Smith, assistant coach of the 1939

National Champion Texas A&M University football team. Smith and his descendants have lived in College Station since its incorporation.

* Four aluminum propeller blades from the Enola Gay B-29 bomber used during the atomic bomb drop on Hiroshima, Japan, during World War II. These items currently reside at the Oran W. Nicks Low Speed Wind Tunnel and were used to operate the tunnel shortly after the war.

* FREDDIE the Robot. Purchased in the late 1970s, FREDDIE, College Station Police Department's robot mascot, helped police officers teach local children about safety. FREDDIE is a symbol of the city's commitment to community policing and a remnant of our 20th-century love of robots.

The George Bush Presidential Library and Museum will offer

free public admission to the city exhibit Nov. 16-17.

The College Station Fire Department is helping spread the word about the dangers of kitchen fires and how to prevent them from starting in the first place. According to the latest National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) research, cooking is the leading cause of home fires. Here are some simple tips you can follow to prevent kitchen fires:

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, broiling or boiling food.
- When you are simmering, baking or roasting food, check it regularly and use a timer to remind you.
- If you have young children, use the stove's back burners whenever possible. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.
- Keep potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper and plastic bags, towels, and anything else that can burn, away from your stovetop.

Recycling Can Be Rewarding

Discount cards now available for 2013

The City of College Station offers curbside recycling to single-family homes, duplexes and most fourplexes for free. Items accepted in the Curbside Recycling Program include: white paper, phone books, newspapers, magazines, #1 and #2 plastic, aluminum/tin/steel cans, clear and brown glass, and lead acid car batteries.

Each eligible residence is provided with clear plastic recycling bags to use to sort and store the recyclable materials. Once the bag is full, you can place it on the edge of the curb by 8 a.m. on the scheduled recycling collection day. Recycling collection is provided once a week, on the same day as bulky items and brush collections.

Floodplains and Flood Insurance What you need to know

Floodplains are regulatory boundaries established to preserve the floodcarrying capacity of our creeks, channels and rivers. These are established by engineering analysis and reviewed, approved and mapped by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). College Station has special regulations in place to regulate construction and other developments within floodplains to help manage potential dangers associated with flooding. Property owners, renters and businesses can purchase flood insurance through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) as a result of the City of College Station's floodplain management ordinances. In exchange, the NFIP provides federally-backed flood insurance affordable rates.

Communities that participate in the NFIP are rated by FEMA through the Community Rating System. FEMA encourages communities to implement floodplain management standards which exceed the minimum NFIP standards. In return, FEMA rewards communities with higher standards by offering a discount on flood insurance policies. The current City of College Station rating is a seven. This rating provides residents with a 15 percent discount on flood insurance policies.

It is important to know that, if you have a mortgage from a federally regulated or insured lender on a home located in a highrisk flood area, federal law requires you to purchase flood insurance. Also, if you've received a federal grant or loan for previous flood losses, you must have a flood policy to qualify for future aid.

Any development in the floodplain without a permit is illegal. To acquire a permit or to report such illegal activity, contact the Planning and Development Department at 979.764.3570. To learn more about floodplains, flood insurance or related information, visit cstx.gov/floodplains.

ELECTION DAY Tuesday, Nov. 6 Double-Check Your Ballot Local Races and Issues will Appear at the Bottom

ne of our most precious rights as American citizens is voting in local, state and national elections. It is also one of our greatest responsibilities.

In the Nov. 6 election, College Station will not have any contested city council or school board places on the ballot, but voters will decide the fate of nine proposed city charter amendments. When you go to your polling place on Election Day, keep in mind that local races and issues will be located at the bottom of the ballot.

City council/school board races

John Nichols and James Benham are unopposed for the College Station City Council and already have been declared elected. Nichols will fill Katy-Maries Lyles' Place 4 seat and Benham will replace Dave Ruesink in Place 6. Incumbents Carol Barrett and Paul Dorsett also are unopposed for places on the College Station ISD school board.

City charter amendments

Eight of the nine charter amendments were proposed by the Citizens Charter Review Advisory Commission, which was created in February 2011. The other deals with conflict of interest issues and was added to

the ballot by the city council. Most of the proposed amendments would bring the charter in line with state law.

Amendment No. 1 would add incompetency, official misconduct or malfeasance as grounds for the recall of council members. The other amendments concern council vacancies, an oath of office, franchises and gender-neutral language.

Early voting

If you might be out of town on Election Day – or to avoid the crowd – you can vote early from Oct. 22-Nov. 2 at any early voting location in Brazos County, including the College Station Utilities Meeting and Training Facility on Graham Road and the Memorial Student Center on the Texas A&M campus.

Absentee/mail-in ballots

The Brazos County Clerk's Office will accept applications for absentee mail-in ballots through Oct. 30 for voters who will be unable to cast their ballots on Election Day or in the early voting period. The mail-in

option is available to voters who are 65 and older, disabled, confined in jail or will be out of the county.

Voter registration

To be eligible to vote in November, unregistered residents have until Oct. 9 to submit an application to the Brazos County voter registrar. Applicants must be at least 18 years old and be legal residents of the county.

Convicted felons are ineligible to vote unless they have completed their sentence, including probation and parole. Those declared mentally incompetent also are ineligible.

Community Development

Housing Assistance Now Available

The following housing assistance programs are available through City of College Station Community Development:

MINOR REPAIR ASSISTANCE is provided through a grant of up to \$5,000 on owner-occupied homes that require necessary but basic repairs. Eligible repairs include: the replacement of an air conditioner or heater, repair to plumbing or electrical systems, or other minor repairs necessary to ensure safe living conditions for the home owner.

REHABILITATION LOAN ASSISTANCE provides up to \$50,000 maximum to rehabilitate owner-occupied homes in the City of College Station. Assistance is provided in the form of a loan; half of the loan will be forgiven monthly over a 10-year period and half will be repaid to the city monthly with a low interest rate.

RECONSTRUCTION LOAN ASSISTANCE provides up to \$110,000 maximum to demolish and reconstruct dilapidated, owner-occupied homes that do not qualify for Rehabilitation Assistance in the City of College Station. Assistance is provided in the form of a loan; half of the loan, not to exceed \$40,000, will be forgiven monthly over a 15-year period and the remainder will be repaid to the city monthly with a low

interest rate.

DOWN PAYMENT ASSISTANCE is in the form of a 0 percent interest deferred loan for up to 15 percent of the purchase price of the home. This assistance can be used for down-payment and up to 30 percent can be used for closing costs for any home in College Station. This helps to lower the cost of homeownership for eligible homebuyers.

PRICE REDUCED: The city has reduced the price on two homes for sale to income eligible households – applicants purchasing one of these homes will receive enhanced Down Payment Assistance of 20 percent of the sales price: 1208 Phoenix - \$104,900 and 1022 Crested Point - \$124,900.

Water IQ

A seasonal water tip

Want another way to raise your Water IQ and lower your utility bill? The 'seasonal adjust' feature on your sprinkler controller can help! With cool weather approaching, you can cut back on landscape irrigation. An easy way to do this—without reprogramming your controller—is to use the Seasonal Adjust feature. Many controllers have this option. This feature automatically reduces the run time as weather conditions change—and all you have to do is push a button.

As a rule of thumb, set the seasonal adjust percentage as follows: winter 30 percent, spring 70 percent, summer 100 percent, and fall 70 percent. At 100 percent, all stations will run for their full programmed time. For example, if the front lawn is scheduled to be watered for 20 minutes in the summer, setting the seasonal adjust feature at 70 percent will automatically reduce run time to 14 minutes.

Does your irrigation controller have a backup battery? It should! Without a battery backup, in the event of a power outage, all of your water settings – including the seasonal adjustment – will be lost and you'll have to adjust the controller again.

Start Recycling Today! *City offers curbside service*

The City of College Station offers curbside recycling to single-family homes, duplexes and most fourplexes for free. Items accepted in the Curbside Recycling Program include: white paper, phone books, newspapers, magazines, #1 and #2 plastic, aluminum/tin/steel cans, clear and brown glass, and lead acid car batteries.

Each eligible residence is provided with clear plastic recycling bags to use to sort and store the recyclable materials. Once the bag is full, you can just place it on the edge of the curb by 8 a.m. on the scheduled recycling collection day. Recycling collection is provided once a week, on the same day as bulky items and brush collections.

The city's Traffic Division maintains and operates 70 traffic signals, 50 pedestrian/school zone flashers, more than 12,000 traffic signs and over 100 miles of long line pavement markings.

Monthly Inspections

City crews inspect the signals each month to make sure vehicle detection, signal indications and pedestrian pushbuttons are operating properly. Signal cabinets are also cleaned regularly, and exhaust fans are checked along with the date, time and coordination program.

We use three types of vehicle detection, which include in-ground loops, video and radar detection. Technicians repair most problems on the spot through our monthly preventative maintenance program, keeping after-hour calls to a minimum and maintaining the level of safety you expect.

Technology Saves Money

Our biggest cost savers are Light

What's up with that Traffic Signal?

Keeping College Station's traffic signals operating efficiently is a bigger job than you think.

Emitting Diodes (LEDs), which are used in all but four of the city's traffic signals. Typically, the LEDs trim electric power consumption by about 75 percent per signal. In pedestrian signals, we use LEDs with countdown timers as an additional safety component.

About 25 percent of our signal system is equipped with Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) units that keep the signal operating for six hours or

more if we lose power.

Retiming Improves Traffic Flow

Our engineers keep a close eye on traffic patterns

and frequently retime the signals along the city's major arteries, which is a cost effective way to significantly reduce wait time and help traffic move smoothly. One recent synchronization reduced travel time by 40 percent during the evening rush hour and by 24 percent during the peak morning time.

However, retiming the signals along major roadways such as Texas Avenue is not a simple task. We must consider such factors as pedestrians, cars entering and exiting businesses, preemption by emergency vehicles, construction projects and the amount of traffic on intersecting streets — as many as 50,000 vehicles a day. Every second of green we give drivers on Texas Avenue adds a second of red to those on intersecting streets.

Other Challenges

Our traffic signals use a preemption system to allow emergency vehicles the right-of-way by stopping conflicting traffic. The railroad tracks in the Wellborn Road corridor also present challenges since trains preempt the signal's normal operation. As many as 20 trains have been known to pass through the area in a 24-hour period, and once a signal is preempted, it can take four or five cycles for it to get back into coordination.

Address Placement Standards *New requirements*

Here's a friendly reminder about our Building and Fire Code requirements for address placement in College Station.

Official building addresses should be placed in a position that is clearly visible from the roadway fronting the property. The address

characters must be a minimum of four inches in height, of a color that provides a contrast to the background and placed at a minimum of 36 inches and a maximum of 30 feet from ground level. If the structure is located more than 50 feet from the street curb then the address characters should be at least five inches in height.

single-family residences, these requirements can be met by placing numbers that are more than two inches in height on both sides of a U.S. mailbox, or a freestanding structure with numbers at least four inches in height.

Building complexes must have the suite or unit numbers and the street address number on each structure, where they are visible from the nearest public street or designated fire lane.

Commercial buildings must display the business name and official address with characters at least two inches in height on all access doors, including side and rear ones.

These requirements are checked and enforced during the final inspection of new construction, by code enforcement officers or by inspectors from the Fire Marshal's Office during their annual inspection.

Storm Drains and Waterways Remove pollutants

Storm drains have a direct connection to lakes, rivers and oceans. They are designed to prevent flooding when heavy rains occur. Rain water washes over streets and into the drains where underground pipes transport it into area creeks, rivers and lakes.

Litter, pet waste, dirt, fertilizers, antifreeze and motor oils are just a few examples of contaminants that enter our waterways through storm drains on neighborhood streets. Keep our waterways clean by:

Following lawn fertilizer package recommendations during treatment;

- Using a commercial car wash that treats or recycles wastewater.
